Take Five Public Launch on Thursday 19 November, Barbican Centre, London

Take Five is a professional development scheme designed to give some of the UK's most talented young jazz musicians the unique opportunity to take 'time out' to develop their craft. Now in its sixth year, **Take Five** provides each artist with the special chance to discuss, explore and strengthen all aspects of their future careers.

To celebrate the launch of the sixth year, audiences will be able to attend a free public event on Thursday 19 November at 6pm in the Barbican's Fountain Room, Silk Street, London EC2Y 8DS, during this year's London Jazz Festival in association with BBC Radio 3 (no tickets required).

Speaking at the event will be previous participants **Dave Stapleton** (Edition II), **Arun Ghosh** (Edition IV) and **Nathaniel Facey** (Edition V) who will share their experiences on and after **Take Five**.

The Jerwood Charitable Foundation and the PRS Foundation for New Music (PRSF) are delighted to announce that international music producers Serious will continue to produce **Take Five** – and to once again welcome the additional support of Arts Council England and the Musicians Benevolent Fund. The Jerwood/PRS Foundation Take Five Initiative will run from October 2009 to June 2010 and it comprises a number of sessions under the collective areas of Talk Time, Learning Time, Focus Time, Time Out and Creative Time. Each artist will benefit from one-to-one sessions to identify their particular areas of interest and need, as well as two residential periods exploring areas such as composition, studio technology, live producing and strategic direction. Take Five will also give participants access to mentoring and an opportunity to engage with those working in other art forms.

Previous participants in **Take Five** commented:

'Taking part in this year's Take Five scheme really helped me to focus on what I want to achieve as a musician as well as giving me more confidence in reaching those aims. Meeting the other musicians was really inspiring and gave me plenty of artistic ideas. The talks really opened my eyes to the way the industry works and gave me ideas about how I might exploit it for my own good! After the first residency I decided that I needed to do something to promote both myself, and the scene in Birmingham. I am now planning an artist driven festival with the Cobweb Collective for next year in Birmingham. This will be a platform for Birmingham based musicians, including myself, which will be designed to raise our profile both locally and nationally. I wouldn't have considered planning something like this before the scheme. The things I learned and the people I met on Take Five gave me the confidence to do this and will hopefully make it a success.' (Chris Mapp, Edition V, 2009)

A panel of industry experts contributed to the selection process, taking into account the following considerations for each participant: excellence in creativity and performance, future potential, distinctive contribution to the jazz community, as well as musical style, geography and range of influences. The panel included representatives from Jerwood Charitable Foundation, PRS Foundation and Serious, as well as Steve Mead (Artistic Director, Manchester Jazz Festival), Chris Sharkey (composer and guitarist) and Soweto Kinch (composer, saxophonist and MC).

Notes:

- 1. The Jerwood Charitable Foundation is committed to imaginative and responsible funding of the arts, supporting emerging and established artists at important stages in their development and across all art-forms. We aim for our funding to allow artists and arts organisations to thrive; to continue to develop their skills, imagination and creativity with integrity. Current partner organisations include Glyndebourne (Jerwood Chorus Development scheme), Aldeburgh Music (Jerwood Opera Writing Programme), Sadler's Wells (the Jerwood Studio) and the Royal Court (Jerwood New Playwrights). The Jerwood Charitable Foundation also funds and manages Jerwood Visual Arts; a year-round gallery programme of prizes, awards, exhibitions and events at the Jerwood Space, London, which then tours the UK.
