One of Serious' key activity strands is 'Seriously Talented', our talent development programmes. In 2004/05, we developed a specific scheme - **Take Five** - in conjunction with partners PRS for Music Foundation and Jerwood Charitable Foundation, to enable emerging creative jazz musicians to explore their creative output and improve their business potential. Since that time, well over 150 musicians have participated in this and related schemes.

Proving that the UK has a formidable array of emerging talent, this year's **EFG London Jazz Festival** is once again hugely enriched by musicians who have participated on our Seriously Talented programmes. There are musicians in clubs, on freestages, in large and small venues, with orchestras, leading contextualising talks – and doing vital work with learning and community engagement.

One such project is the collaboration between **Phronesis** and the **Engines Orchestra**, specially commissioned for the festival with the Cheltenham and Manchester jazz festivals and featuring **Jasper Høiby**, **Ivo Neame** and **Phil Meadows** – all Take Five alumni (Sunday 12 November). **Moses Boyd's Exodus** takes the stage at the Jazz Café on the opening night of the festival; **Arun Gosh** appears at the Rich Mix on 11 November; **Nikki Yeoh** supports Courtney Pine and Omar (13 November) and **Yazz Ahmed** launches her new CD at Kings Place on 17 November. There is also guitarist **Chris Montague**'s participatory **'A Brief History of the Coolest Instrument in the World'** (part of the '25 for 25' commissioning programme), a free event taking place at the Clore Ballroom on Saturday 18 November. And one of the superstar artists of the festival – Pat Metheny - features **Gwilym Simcock** in his new line-up. These are just a few of the more than 50 Seriously Talented alumni appearing at the festival.

This season is also the time to announce the participants in the thirteenth edition of **Take Five: UK**, which is supported by Jerwood Charitable Foundation, PRS for Music Foundation, Arts Council England, Help Musicians UK and the Serious Trust.

Take Five is designed to give some of the UK's most talented young jazz musicians the unique opportunity to take 'time out' to develop their craft and their business. It provides each artist with

the chance to discuss, explore and strengthen all aspects of their future careers. The edition will run until the summer of 2018 and provides participants with one-to-one mentoring sessions to address their particular areas of need, as well a residential period in February for exploring areas such as composition, performance, communications, business infrastructure and strategic direction.

The exciting career progressions of many participants from recent years, like Moses Boyd, Heidi Heidelberg, Peter Edwards, Laura Jurd and more, demonstrate the quality of artists taking part in this scheme and the crucial springboard it offers at pivotal stages in artists' development. I look forward to following the outcomes of next year's programme and seeing these artists shine in future editions of the London Jazz Festival and beyond.'

A panel of industry experts contributed to the selection process, taking into account the following considerations: creativity, future potential, style of music, range of influences, and distinctive contribution to the jazz community. The panel included representatives from Jerwood Charitable Foundation, PRS for Music Foundation and Serious, as well as Graham McKenzie (Director, hcmf//, Huddersfield Contemporary Music Festival), Steve Mead (Manchester Jazz Festival) and Soweto Kinch (composer, rapper, producer and saxophonist).
