Serious' successful talent development schemes for emerging creative jazz musicians, **Seriously Talented**, will again 'take over' during the **EFG London Jazz Festival**.

We have many reasons to celebrate because the concert halls, free stages and clubs will resound with performances by outstanding bands from the UK and Europe, led by artists who have participated in a Seriously Talented programme.

This year there are over 40 artists featured across the Festival from UK (Take Five: UK); Switzerland (Take Five: Switzerland); France, Norway and Poland (Take Five: Europe), Scotland (Air Time: Jazz CPD Scotland) and artists working in music of African and Caribbean origin (Move On Up).

To bring it all into focus, on Sunday 15 November, the Clore Ballroom at the Southbank Centre will host a celebration beginning at 2pm. This will include an afternoon of free performances led by Seriously Talented artists and we will also take the opportunity to announce the artists who will participate in the eleventh edition of **Take Five: UK** – the original programme in the Seriously Talented suite.

First up will be the public debut of the band that was created as part of **Take Five Edition X**, which showcases the talents of eight composer-performers from across the UK including: **Emilia Mårtensson** (vocals), **Heidi Heidelberg** (vocals/guitar), **Lauren Kinsella** (vocals), **Alice Zawadzki** (vocals/violin), **Phil Meadows** (saxophone), **Sam Andreae** (saxophone/electronics), **Tom Green** (trombone) and **Percy Pursglove** (trumpet/bass).

This will be followed by **The Spirit Farm** – a new six-piece group of innovative improvisers based in the north of England, led by **Adam Fairhall** (piano) and featuring **Corey Mwamba** (vibraphone), **Christophe de Bezenac** (saxophone), **Dave Kane** (double bass), **Anton Hunter** (guitar) and **Johnny Hunter** (drums). Together they bring quick instincts, an impressive shared understanding and a wealth of idiomatic approaches to the music.

International programmes are represented by the trio of **Marc Perrenoud**, the Swiss pianist whose work has been described as: *'harmonically complex, subtle ... with a tangible lyrical intensity'*.

The final performance of the afternoon will be from **TRACES** led by **Cevanne Horrocks-Hopayian.** It will feature a new work that marks the centenary of her Armenian family fleeing to Syria as refugees, and celebrates her Western roots in Suffolk. She takes inspiration from the travelling 'gusanner' musicians, Komitas – the forefather of ethnomusicology, Benjamin Britten and the work of American drummer Paul Motian, another descendent of Armenian migrants. This quartet features **Cevanne** (vocals, harp and sonic bonnet/electronics), **Chris Montague** (guitar), **Conor Chaplin** (double bass) and **Corrie Dick** (drums).

Cevanne's commission has been generously supported by Cockayne - Grants for the Arts and the London Community Foundation and is one of five commissions to mark the tenth anniversary of Seriously Talented. Other new works include those from Norwegian participant in Take Five Europe, **Daniel Herskedal** (Kings Place, Saturday 14 November) and Scottish participant in Air Time, **Lauren Sarah Hayes** (Kings Place, Saturday 14 November), UK participant in Move On Up, **Adriano Adewale** (Within the Waves, Cecil Sharp House, Thursday 19 November), and French participant in Take Five Europe, **Airelle Besson** (Barbican Freestage on Sunday 22 November).

During the afternoon of 15 November, the participants in **Take Five: UK Edition XI** will also be announced to the public. **Take Five: UK** is supported by Jerwood Charitable Foundation, PRS for Music Foundation, Arts Council England and Help Musicians UK and is designed to give some of the UK's most talented young jazz musicians the unique opportunity to take 'time out' to develop their craft and their business. It provides each artist with the chance to discuss, explore and strengthen all aspects of their future careers.

The eight creative jazz musicians who have been selected for **Take Five Edition XI** are:

- Moses Boyd (drums, London)
- Elliot Galvin (piano, London)
- Zoe Gilby (vocals, Gateshead)
- Anton Hunter (guitar, Manchester)
- Hyelim Kim (taegŭm, London)
- Zara McFarlane (vocals, London)
- Cath Roberts (saxophone, London)
- Craig Scott (guitar, Leeds)

Take Five Edition XI will run until the summer of 2016 and provides participants with one-to-one mentoring sessions to address their particular areas of need, as well a residential period exploring areas such as composition, performance, communications, business infrastructure and strategic direction.

Vanessa Reed, Executive Director, PRS for Music Foundation said: 'Congratulations to all of the jazz musicians that have been selected for this year's Take Five. Yet again this programme highlights the breadth of talented jazz musicians in the UK and the interest they share in taking their career to the next level. I look forward to hearing more about their plans at the Take Five residency early next year.'

A panel of industry experts contributed to the selection process, taking into account the following considerations: creativity, future potential, style of music, range of influences, and distinctive contribution to the jazz community. The panel included representatives from Jerwood Charitable Foundation, PRS for Music Foundation and Serious, as well as Kevin Le Gendre (journalist and broadcaster), Steve Mead (Manchester Jazz Festival) and Alexander Hawkins (composer, pianist and member of the Take Five Family).
